








Overweight and Obesity in Broward County




Hospitalizations from or with Diabetes

Hospitalizations from or with Diabetes: Race




Converging Above County Rates of Diabetes and Determinants in Broward County



Diabetes Crude Rate = 155 per 100,000







Broward Commissioners Approve Stricter Regulations for Child Daycare Centers

BROWARD COUNTY, FL - Broward County Commissioners have approved new daycare regulations designed to encourage physical fitness, provide better nutrition and promote a more hygienic environment.

Under the leadership of Broward County Commissioner Martin David Kiar, Commissioners passed amended regulations that will affect an estimated 90,000 children in Broward County daycare centers and children attending school programs operated by private companies.

The revised ordinance ensures at least forty hours of exercise, low or no fat milk products for children under two years old, more time spent outside instead of watching television,



prohibits sharing of homemade snacks unless for cultural celebrations and mandates shaded areas on the playground. Time spent in front of a computer would also be restricted with the exception of computer use for home work.

"Broward County is the licensing agency for childcare facilities in the county. As it stands now, a child care facility can sit a child before a TV for four hours, and they can call that physical education. If they want to give them a snack, they can give them candy or fast foods, "said Kiar. "For me, it's very important that we instill good habits in our children. Right now I think there are a lot of children that would rather sit inside and play rather than go outside and play on their own. That's what the impetus was in bringing this ordinance," explained Commissioner Kiar.

Dozens of public meetings were held with daycare center operators and stakeholders involved in the regulation process. After much public discussion and debate among Commissioners, the new regulations were passed by the majority of the Commission.

"I think this I think it's going to be a model for other counties and for Florida," said Commissioner Kiar.








