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

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

The BoykinZ, a sister quartet hailing from the suburbs of Atlanta with deep southern roots, is known to media nationwide as the "**Black girls of the country**."

As influencers and content creators, they successfully launched their fusion country music brand January 2022 on TikTok, which went viral. **Though singing for 10 years** prior to their digital online explosion, The BoykinZ, Kylan (21), Anale (20), Nytere (18) and Alona (15) have amassed more than 60 million views, nearly a half-million followers and more than 10 million likes and growing daily.

They are accredited songwriters with a unique sound, blending soulful harmonies that infuses country with pop, rock, soul and hip-hop. **Fortune 100** brands and others have acknowledged their success nationally. The BoykinZ have created and delivered social media campaigns for T-Mobile, Nike, Universal's Minions movie, Conair Man, Neon Cowboys and Cash App. They recently were named the ambassadors for the Gibson Guitar app.

Their first single, "Girl's Night©," is available on all streaming platforms with a recognized engaging line dance that is picking up steam with fans across the U.S.

Dr. Garth Graham

Director and global head of Healthcare for Google/YouTube

raham is a cardiologist, public health expert and a leading authority on social determinants of health and health equity. He has led several national efforts to tackle health disparities and social determinants of health and has dedicated his career to improving the lives of minority and underserved communities.

He previously served in two U.S. administrations as U.S. deputy assistant secretary for health and was assistant dean for health policy and chief of health services research in the Department of Medicine at the University of Florida School of Medicine.

Graham earned a Doctor of Medicine at the Yale University School of Medicine and a Master of Public Health at the Yale School of Public Health. He studied internal medicine at Massachusetts General Hospital and went through a cardiology fellowship at Johns Hopkins University. He holds three board certifications, including internal medicine, cardiology and interventional cardiology. He also holds an honorary Doctor of Laws from Regis College and is an elected member of the National Academy of Medicine.

She holds a Ph.D. in Public Health and Community Medicine from the Kirby Institute, University of New South Wales, Australia. Dr. Allison is passionate about improving access to health care for disadvantaged populations, whether that disadvantage is geographical, racial, cultural, gender-based or economical. She successfully secured continuous federal funding for her work, which includes directing the National Rural Telementoring Training Center and a project to integrate the National HIV Curriculum e-Learning Platform into Health Care Professions Programs.







Brian R. Benson, DPM, MS, MPH, AACFAS, DABPM

Foot & Ankle Reconstructive Surgeon Beauregard Health System

DC Benson is a fellowship-trained podiatric foot and ankle reconstructive surgeon, specializing in advanced reconstruction of the foot, ankle and lower leg, including total ankle joint replacements, external fixation, limb lengthening, supra-malleolar osteotomies, minimally invasive surgery, foot and ankle trauma, orthoplastic techniques, arthroscopic cartilage repair, diabetic limb salvage and complex deformity correction. Benson is board qualified by the American Board of Foot and Ankle Surgery in foot, as well as reconstructive rearfoot & ankle surgery. Additionally, he's a board certified diplomate by the American Board of Podiatric Medicine. Benson has been an attending surgeon at Beauregard Health System in DeRidder, LA, since 2021 and serves as an orthopedic device consultant and design surgeon for various orthopedic implant companies. He has lectured at various national conferences and is currently engaged in multiple research projects. Most recently, Benson was appointed as associate professor at Virginia College of Osteopathic Medicine - Monroe Campus.



Mark Cunningham, PhD, MBA

Cunningham is an assistant professor of Physiology and Anatomy at the Health Science Center. He is active in the American Heart Association and the American Physiology Society, serves as editor on numerous scientific journals and has over 45 peer-review publications. He enjoys teaching, mentoring, ministry, learning, traveling and community service. Dr. Cunningham is a native of the Atlanta, GA. metropolitan area and a proud graduate of Morehouse College. He attended the University of Florida for graduate school and the University of Mississippi Medical Center for his postdoctoral training and as faculty. His research focus is on maternal





health and fetal programing. More specifically, the Cunningham lab examines the mechanisms for dysfunction of blood vessels in the brain, cardiovascular diseases and high blood pressure in females during and after pregnancy and in their children. The clinical implications of this work are to study sex differences in the children of hypertensive moms and to provide insights for therapies and approaches to improve the lives of both the mother and her baby during pregnancy and beyond. Dr. Cunningham's motto is "Excellence in all things."



Kristopher S. Ingram, PGY-2
